There are a large number of vacant homes on the south side of Walker Ave owned now by the Cato company. Is there a future plan to build high density housing in lieu of these old homes?

City Launches Mobile App for Recycling and Trash Info

Greensboro Field Operations has launched a new mobile phone app – GSO Collects -- that tells residents everything they need to know about the City's residential recycling and trash collection operations. The free app is available for Apple and Android.

"If you get the GSO Collects App, you'll never miss a collection again," said Tori Carle, Greensboro's recycling program manager. "The app let's you set reminders to put out your yard waste, recycling, or that old chair you've got taking up space in the garage. The app will also notify you if there is any service change due to a holiday or inclement weather."

GSO Collects also helps residents determine which items are recyclable or should be taken to the household hazardous waste collection site. Visit www.greensboro-nc.gov/collects for more information and to use the desktop version of the app.

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Sunset Hills Park Adopt-a-Bed Program


Among the many perks of living in Sunset Hills is having access to our neighborhood park. Part of Greensboro's extensive park system, Sunset Hills (formerly Greenway) Park offers 9.7 acres of not only natural areas that provide a home to many birds and other critters, but also recreational facilities including two playgrounds and a tennis court. The city's Parks and Recreation Department officially manages Sunset Hills Park and in the past couple of years has improved it by adding electrification and resurfacing the tennis court. However, given that the city currently manages more than 150 parks, and that the number of new parks keeps growing while the Parks and Recreation staff does not, keeping these parks in peak condition requires the help of the neighbors who enjoy them.

Many years ago, the Sunset Hills Garden Club adopted the section of the park that runs between W. Friendly Avenue and W. Market Street. Twice a year, members have gathered to pull weeds, spread mulch, and prune back overgrowth. But as our membership has grown less young, our group has turned over some of these tasks to paid landscape professionals, using our dues to finance maintenance of the stream beds and other tasks requiring extensive physical labor. The Sunset Hills Neighborhood Association has also generously contributed to the upkeep of the park, recently providing necessary funding for the Garden Club to hire landscaping services.



Yet, there are still many smaller maintenance tasks that need doing. Last summer, several members of the Garden Club did a walking tour of the area between Friendly and W. Market and identified each of the various garden beds that dot the park. These beds were then grouped into nine distinct areas, which various members "adopted." Each adopter agreed to monitor the beds several times a year to determine what needed to be done to keep them in good shape, be that weeding, pruning, mulching, or watering.

We'd love to have the help of neighbors in this ongoing program to ensure that the park is a pleasant place for folks to enjoy nature, walk their dogs, and play with their kids. If you're interested, please contact Gerry Alfano at mtisdel@att.net. Gerry will be happy to provide you with more information about the Adopt-a-Bed program and put you in contact with the volunteers in charge of each bed. The park is an essential part of what makes our neighborhood great. With the combined efforts of the community, it will continue to flourish.

What to do with unused and unwanted nail polish

When you no longer want your bottle of nail polish, it should not just be tossed into the trash. Nail polish often contains toxins that are harmful to the environment, so nail polish should not go into the landfill.

Even if your nail polish is dried out or gummed up something can be done with it by you or someone else or it can be disposed of at the Household Hazardous Waste Center 2750 Patterson St. (Wed-Fri 10-6 and Sat 8-2.)

You can also consider creative reuse options for your old nail polish! A quick google search will show you how to revitalize dried-out or gummed up nail polish and give you plenty of uses for it other than polishing your nails. Or you could consider taking your old nail polish to Reconsidered Goods so that others in our community can use the paint, bottles, or both for creative purposes. http://www.reconsideredgoods.org.

Chemwise has a mailin recycling program. (http://chemwise.org/services-nail- polish.html) They are able to process the bottles and recycle the glass container, applicator brush, and the polish. It is not a cheap program, but if you gather enough nail polish between you and your neighbors it could be worth it!


Scam Alert!!!

The Dragon in our Family By Kathleen Martinek

What I remember most about my cousins Barb and Cindy were the two weeks my sister Anne and I spent at their house in the summer. It was only 45 min away in St Charles, IL, but it was a real vacation. We went to Pottawatomie Park, swam and picnicked, went on the rides.

Cindy would try anything. While Barb was content on the swing set, Cindy was climbing with the boys. She played all sports, loved sewing and gardening, and was an A student all the way through college at the University of Dayton, even President of the National Honor Society. She majored in Elementary Education and married John her senior year. They had their first child at 22 and Cindy was in her element-- mothering, teaching, leading girl and boy scout troops, creating an exciting home.

They had 2 more kids and then at age 30 things started to change. Barb noticed Cindy acting funny and having trouble relating to people. They both remembered their father and their eighteen year old brother with the same mysterious symptoms that no one wanted to talk about—difficulty speaking and carrying out basic daily tasks like brushing teeth and making a sandwich. Later came the wild movements and the family went through "hell" trying to take care of her. Few doctors and hospitals knew how to treat it except to move Cindy to a nursing home where she was wheeled in a special mesh "bucket" to keep her from falling out. She died there in her late 40's.

I recall my father's words: "We **have** to get rid of this dragon in the family."

Huntington's Disease is a family disease -- Because it is directly hereditary, each child of a parent with the defective gene has a 50/50 chance of getting it. There are often three generations of HD in the same family at the same time. It is a brain disorder and. like Cindy, most people eventually are not able to walk, talk, think or reason.

But there is so much **HOPE** now! Two major breakthroughs in the last eight months have caused cheers around the world. We are getting closer to finding an effective treatment.



My Musical Journey from Pit to Stage By Kevin Dollar

I've played guitar for most of my life. In fact, I can't remember a time that didn't involve the instrument. In my adolescence it was an identity for me - the thing I did that set me apart from others. In my early adulthood it was my budding career and I lived by the philosophy of saying yes first, and then asking what the gig was later. I still do that from time to time.

I like to be exposed to all styles of music and people from all walks of life in the hopes that I can share those experiences with my students. As I enter my fourth decade in the music business, I find myself still trying to learn and to do those things that I never got around to in my earlier years of playing and performing. When the artistic director of the Greensboro Opera Company, David Holley, asked me if I would agree to being on stage in costume instead of performing as a member of the orchestra, of course, I said yes.

I've known David since my early years as a student in the School of Music at UNCG. David was an intimidating presence in the academic world, always slightly larger than life to me and belonging to the world of "voice" that rarely crossed paths with those of us in the guitar department. Over my nearly twenty-year tenure at the Music Academy of North Carolina (MANC) I had the fortunate opportunity to personally meet and professionally work with David. David was frequently involved in MANC events (his partner Laura taught piano there). This led to my brief stint in Don Pasquale and started my path towards the opera stage.

Several years ago I relocated to Greensboro, specifically the Sunset Hills area, having been a commuter since 2001. As I started to reintegrate myself into the local community more actively, all sorts of opportunities arose. I became a member in three local groups (swing, Latin and rock bands), opened a private teaching



studio in the downtown area but more importantly started to look for ways to invest myself into the aspects of the music scene that I wouldn't normally be a part of.

When I got the first call from David about helping out with Greensboro Opera Company's (GSO) fundraiser for last year's "Carmen," I knew I was about to start a relationship that would be fun, rewarding, and perhaps a little intimidating. One of my projects, The Minor Swing Band, dressed for the part and played traditional European gypsy jazz for the event (aptly named GO Gypsy). In fact, violinist Ryan Eversole and I were able to accompany Sandra Eddy in the Habanera as she strolled through the room as a preview of her upcoming operatic performance. This experience gave me my first taste of performance in costume, and I was already looking forward to more of the same. When I got the next call from David about performing in the Barber of Seville, of course I said yes, without giving it a second thought.

Before the performance, I found myself in a tuxedo performing "Se Il Mio

Nome" from the Barber of Seville in our promotional event for the opera. During this 2017 Eastern Music Festival event, David had requested that I tease my hair out, wear a tie-dyed t-shirt and rock a Wah pedal (try Wikipedia for an explanation) on the theme from "Hair." His hair-themed "Shave and a Haircut..." show gave me one more chance to experience a little time on the stage and out of the orchestra pit. I even had a line or two in this one.

David's creativeness is one of the main reasons that the GOC is so well-liked in our community. He doesn't just present an opera, he develops a sense of expectation throughout the year so that it's easy to feel more personally involved when the performances finally arrive.


When I received the call about meeting at a local coffee shop to discuss ideas for my role in the upcoming presentation by the company, I knew going in that I would agree regardless of what he proposed. When David asked me if I'd be willing to be on stage in costume, of course I said yes, and then returned home to agonize over the decision later. What did I know about being on stage in this capacity? When I'm out front, I'm presenting my music on guitar, but here would I have to do anything different? Well, the answer was yes as I was to find out after starting rehearsals. Guitarists are fond of improvising when playing rock or jazz, but you can't improvise in an opera. You also can't consult the score occasionally as you do when playing with the symphony pops or in a classical concert. You can't continue to watch the conductor when a cast member pops out of the scenery above you either.

Being on stage is akin to being in a dream. You are trying to act normal as if you were really in the situation being presented, and



that's difficult when half of those around you are in tights, wigs and period dress and the other half are consulting notebooks and chatting in headsets to organize movement and scenery backstage. You try to remember where to look when the next event happens, and what chords to play in the next tune, when to pause, when to run off stage, when to smile and when to frown. In the entire 3-hour production I had only two tunes, my first being in the pit with the rest of the orchestra and the second being on stage. My journey from pit to stage in between those two songs was one of the most rewarding and joyous moments of my musical career. Next time David calls, I expect, of course, to say yes.





New Year, New Tax Plan – What Every Homeowner Needs to Know

By now you've likely heard that a new tax bill recently passed. But, what you may not know is how homeowners will be impacted by the changes. If you're in the market to buy or already own your home, here's what you can expect in 2018 and beyond:

Deductions to your Deductions

Arguably, the most significant change to the tax plan is in how many interest deductions are now available to homeowners. With the previous plan, Americans received several tax incentives that made home ownership more affordable and quite appealing. The new plan impacts the following deductions:

1. *Mortgage interest.* Previously, qualified homeowners could reduce their taxable income by the amount of mortgage interest they paid each year – up to one million dollars for married couples filing jointly (\$500k for singles or married couples filing separately).

Mortgage interest is still tax deductible with the new plan, but only up to \$750k for married couples filing jointly (\$375k for singles or married couples filing separately). This change impacts all homes purchased after December 15, 2017, and is also applicable to mortgages on second homes.

- Property tax. The new bill now includes restrictions on the amount of property tax you can deduct from your taxable income. Now, homeowners may deduct up to \$10k in property taxes (\$5k for couples filing separately and singles), including state and local taxes or sales taxes.
- 3. *Home equity.* With the former tax plan, homeowners could deduct the interest paid on home equity debt for reasons other than to renovate your home (like for college expenses, for example). The home equity deduction was completely eliminated with the new tax plan.
- 4. *Moving expenses.* The old plan included deductions for qualified homeowners relocating for a new job. Now, moving expenses are only deductible for active duty members of the armed forces.

To itemize, or not to itemize.

Another significant change: an increase in the standard tax deductions (or, the flat amount that the tax system lets homeowners deduct, no questions asked). **Beginning in 2018, the standard deductions per household nearly doubles, increasing from \$12,700 to \$24k** (for married couples who file jointly).

This change means more Americans will likely forego itemizing their taxes for 2018. In previous years, itemizing typically resulted in more money in your pocket at refund time. Now, you may be able to save time by not itemizing and still benefit financially.

Ultimately, the new tax plan will impact every taxpayer differently. Even with the lower interest deductions, the bill introduces new tax brackets, which could reduce your individual tax rate and increase your paycheck. 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UPDATE ON TRAFFIC SAFETY IN SUNSET HILLS By Gerry Alfano

I am happy to report that we have had some progress in our campaign to improve traffic safety in Sunset Hills. As many of you know, we have been working with Adam Fischer, Director of the Greensboro Department of Transportation (GDOT), the police department's traffic enforcement unit, and Nancy Hoffmann, our district 4 city council representative, following a serious accident at W. Greenway and W. Friendly last May. We held two SH neighborhood meetings, one in September and one in November, with GDOT and the police department to address the issues and come up with solutions.

Radar Speed Signs – The police department put up two radar speed signs on Friendly before Christmas. These signs were battery powered and were taken down after a few weeks because they needed to be recharged. We currently have two signs on W. Friendly – one facing west near N. Elam Ave and one facing east near N. Tremont. There are also two on N. Elam – one facing north near Rolling Rd. and one facing south near Madison Ave. One of the signs on each street is solar powered and belongs to GDOT. The other two are battery operated and belong to the police department. They seem to be having a general effect on reducing speeding in those areas.

State Law Yield to Pedestrian signs. We have been trying to get these signs on the pedestrian islands on Elam. These signs make these islands much more visible to drivers. The island at S. Elam and Camden did not have a sign until the first week in February. The island was installed in September and there was post, but no sign. Sometime in January the post was flattened. Finally, 5 months after the installation of the island, we have a sign at Camden and S. Elam. The sign went up on the pedestrian island at Rolling Rd. in January. When GDOT installed the pedestrian crossing at Rolling Rd., they were not willing to put in a sign. However, after our meetings with GDOT, Adam Fischer agreed to install one.

Elam and Friendly Pedestrian Crosswalk Signals – We have never had a real crosswalk signal at N. Elam and W. Friendly, even though there is a bus stop, Wesley Long Hospital with the Moses Cancer Center is a block up on N. Elam, and Friendly Shopping Center is a few blocks west. GDOT agreed that we need crosswalk signals at that intersection. Adam Fischer estimates that these pedestrian signals should be installed sometime in April.

Traffic Light on W. Friendly at W. Greenway - Adam Fischer reports that they are studying the possibility of putting a light at W. Greenway and W. Friendly. GDOT is not going to divert traffic as they originally planned, but they are going to do a count at both intersections (E. and W. Greenway) to meet the signal warrants. A complicating factor which may make a traffic signal at this location impractical is that there is no left turn lane on Friendly Avenue. There could be some operational issues if they installed a traffic signal without a dedicated left turn lane. GDOT is continuing to evaluate this.

Timing of the Traffic Lights at W. Friendly and Radiance – If you have used the pedestrian crossing light at W. Friendly and Radiance, you know how fast cars approach that intersection. In addition, there is quite a bit of red light running. According to GDOT, the lights there are not timed because the distance is too far between the traffic lights at Elam and the lights at Radiance. If they install traffic lights at W. Greenway, then they could also time the lights so that cars going above the speed limit get stopped at this light.

Four-way Stop Signs – There is no progress to report on installing additional four-way stop signs. We did request a four-way stop at Sylvan and S. Chapman and we also discussed four-way stops at other intersections. I will follow up with Adam Fischer on this issue.

Speeding on W. Market St. – This was supposed to be included in the speeding assessment of Sunset Hills, but it has not been done. While the speeding does not seem as wide spread as that on Friendly, it is still a problem, especially going east from Chapman. I will also follow up with Adam Fischer and the police department about this problem.

Progress is slower than we would like, but we are moving forward with some changes. The police department promised that we would continue to get traffic enforcement from its unit, but I have only seen them in SH once since the Running of the Balls. Currently, the traffic enforcement unit consists of only five motorcycle officers. We are competing for them with the entire city. Clearly, we need more officers dedicated to traffic enforcement.

-We met Captain Thompson, newly appointed/hired to be the Captain for District 1, in which Sunset Hills is located. He made a very nice first impression: experienced, has worked in District 1 before, is the father of 3 year old twins.

-You can check your credit reports for free at annualcreditreport.com, I have not personally checked this site, but it was recommended by Officer Wingfield to another neighborhood representative who was having strange charges on her credit card.

- Yellow Dot Program: this was new to me, so I thought others would like to know about it. Greensboro Police & Guilford County Sheriff's office are working together to educate people about the Yellow Dot Program. Residents can fill out a form with medical information. Then they place a yellow dot sticker at their front door or rear car window that alerts police and EMTs to look for pertinent info such as medication lists if are needed. -City Council meetings have a new format: 1st Tuesday of the month is Town Hall style, where anyone can sign up to speak for a five minutes on any subject they wish to address. 3rd Tuesday of the month is business format, which will still include some public input at the beginning.


-HiYa app is helpful for robo calls on your mobile phone, I have no idea which types of phones it works with, but several people were suggesting it.

-Issues in other neighborhoods: 1) low income housing coming on Muir's Chapel Rd (zoning meetings being held); 2) influx of tree removal people knocking on doors - not all are insured - don't use door-to-door offers, call the city arborist first - you are responsible if uninsured people are injured on your property or if they damage property around the tree; 3) GPD does NOT encourage Neighborhood Watch participants to patrol the neighborhoods using guns; as always, lock cars & watch out for neighbors.

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
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
